THE PLATINUM DHUBH 2016

As mentioned in our last Green Banner, the CMA will celebrate the 70th anniversary of its founding at the Gathering in Badenoch in 2016. This article provides Branch members with an update on the planning for this event and is to encourage early hotel bookings and registration due to the anticipated high demand for attendance.

Based on interest expressed by the Branches, the committee is making plans for bumper attendance figures (expected to be 350). The Duke of Gordon Hotel is already taking bookings and is starting to fill up. The hotel has 65 rooms and logistically they would prefer to fill them with Gathering attendees only. Please, if you want to be there book accommodation a.s.a.p.

Preparations and plans are being finalized but currently we can expect the following program of events. Activities start earlier than normal on Wednesday 3rd August with a guided tour of Edinburgh's Royal Mile by Sandy Macpherson followed by afternoon tea at Sandy & Catherine's home, hosted by Catherine and Shelagh Macpherson Noble.

On Thursday there is a Highland Dress display organized at a bespoke dressmaker in Pitlochry. Most of the items are for the ladies but there will be some items of interest for the men. Alternatively John Barton will be giving a guided tour of the town of Kingussie.

On Friday Jamie of Cluny is hosting a golf tournament (participants will pay green fees and club rental if necessary) plus there will be the usual committee meetings, dance practice and Highland Ball in the evening.

A standard Gathering day happens on Saturday including the AGM in the morning, the Clan March and highland games in the afternoon plus the evening Ceilidh at the Duke of Gordon. The Museum At Home will be announced later.

Church Service, Picnic at the Cairn lead us to lunchtime on Sunday and are followed by a Whisky Tasting in the afternoon. On Sunday evening attendees will congregate at Ruthven Barracks for another Ceilidh. Any pipers or drummers planning to attend should let organizers know in advance as the plan is to have a CMA virtual pipe band. Music will be sent out in advance to allow practice beforehand. After the Ceilidh, as dusk approaches, a torch lit parade will process from Ruthven Barracks down the hill and back to the Duke of Gordon Hotel. Members that were present at the last milestone Gathering (The Really Big Dhubh) have mentioned this sight was quite spectacular.

John Barton will lead the customary Monday morning walk of interest for the clan and in the afternoon a lecture will be presented at the museum (several sittings may be required to accommodate everyone).

For those with some energy left Tuesday sees a visit to the Highland Folk Museum in Newtonmore plus a visit to the Drumguish and/or Ballandalloch Distilleries.

As you can see a variety of interesting events is scheduled and the organizing committee is doing an excellent job in providing something for everyone. The committee is also very conscious of the expense to members and potential liability of excess expenditure on the Association. All that they ask is that you commit and register early.

Current planning is to have the 2016 Creag Dhubh available for circulation this coming December so that costs and registration details are available to everyone. Key decisions need to be made regarding many things (eg. size of marquis tent to be rented) and in order to not disappoint anyone cut off dates will need to be made for registration.

Please let me know at Canada.Chair@clan-macpherson.org if you are planning to attend so that I can keep the committee informed of our anticipated Branch participation and remember if you want to stay at the Duke of Gordon Hotel book now.

JUSTICE EWAN ALEXANDER MACPHERSON KC, LLD



Ewan MacPherson, the first Chairman of the Canadian Branch, serving from 1949 to 1952, was born in the USA in Worth County Missouri in 1879. Shortly after Ewan was born, his father decided to move to Canada and the family settled in Portage la Prairie a small town about 50 km west of the City of Winnipeg. In those days the Canadian prairie was a wide-open space and the Province of Manitoba which had been established in 1870, was called the “postage stamp province”. It was comprised of just the southern portion and was 1/18 of the size of the current Manitoba. The rest of the prairie was still called the “Northwest” all the way to the Rockies

Ewan grew up in this pioneer setting and articulated in law with a firm in Portage. This meant he learned law in a practical way, starting as a clerk and working his way up until he was called to the Manitoba Bar in 1903. He then practiced law at a firm in Portage, which included Arthur Meighan, who later became Prime Minister of Canada for two brief terms. Ewan’s exposure to this political heavyweight probably influenced his entry into politics.

Ewan was elected alderman in Portage in 1906 and then to the Manitoba Legislature in 1914. In 1926 he became Liberal MP for Portage la Prairie and went to Ottawa to serve under Arthur Meighan who was in his second term as PM for a few months that year. In 1932, Ewan became the Provincial Treasurer of Manitoba. He was well thought of in political circles and touted to be Premier of Manitoba by federal liberals. This never happened as he started to rise in judicial appointments.

Ewan was appointed King’s Counsel (KC) in 1916, recognizing his legal capability. In 1937 he was appointed Chief Justice of the Court of Kings Bench, which was the superior court of Manitoba. He was appointed Chief Justice of Manitoba in 1944, serving in that capacity until 1954.

Ewan was married in 1904 and with his wife Winnifred raised a family of three boys and a girl. He was an active Freemason and Master of the Blue Lodge. He was involved in several charitable organizations such as the Save the Children Fund.

He was an avid duck hunter and had a good sense of humour, He liked to tell stories about hunting, sometimes with the joke on him, such as the following:

“I was standing in a marsh with my pump gun when five blue bills came by. I shot the first one and it dropped into the water. Then I shot the remaining four, one after another. The first one got up and I shot and missed. Then the others got up and flew away”

In 1948, the University of Manitoba recognized his contributions to society by granting him an Honorary Doctor of Laws degree.

Ewan died in 1954 while attending his son’s wedding in Kenora Ontario, located about 200 km east of Winnipeg.

We were indeed fortunate to have had this prestigious man as our first Chairman, promoting the then new CMA Branch, particularly in Western Canada.

I am pleased to be accompanied by Bob & Sylvia MacPherson from Cochrane, Alberta who joined CMA through our Branch last year, Ed Smith our Ontario Provincial Councillor, plus dual Branch member Donna Dee McPherson Rucks and of course the woman that keeps me right at all times Irene.

This weekend in Saskatchewan another Gathering is taking place called 'Scotland on the Prairies' (a website is set up with that name if you would like more information). This event was brought to our attention by Elaine McPherson one of the organizers and is for the descendents and families of Angus McPherson and Flora McCormick who settled in Wapella, Saskatchewan in the early 1900s. Elaine was anticipating about 100 attendees. A surprise visitor to the tent was a Stewart Macpherson who informed Bob that his Grandfather had sold his home in Newtonmore in 1951 to the CMA and that it is now the clan museum. It is indeed a small world we live in.

I mentioned our Green Banner Branch Newsletter which is an excellent publication and we are indeed indebted to our editor Mark for all of his work in collecting and organizing the articles. Several years ago we set up infrastructure across the country with the introduction of Provincial Councillors in each Province. We are starting to see articles from each of the Provinces in our Newsletter. Our Association is fortunate indeed with the work done by Jan & team for Creag Dhubh and all of the other Branch editors and officers that are recording the present for future generations.

I am sure many of our members are planning to attend the Platinum Dhubh/70th Anniversary Gathering next year and am pleased that with some help from the Scottish Branch (Norman in particular) and the guidance of our heraldic artist Gordon the Branch has prepared a design to be used to commemorate this important milestone.

We had representation at the tartan day parade in Port Hope (Bob Archibald and Ed Smith) and at the St. Andrews Day Ball in Toronto (Bob & Ed plus Chantal & Vice Chair Jacqueline) and we are looking forward to the highlight of our Branch year, the Annual Gathering. Every 5 years we join forces with our US cousins and this year an excellent program

awaits us in Chicago during the first weekend in October. About 100 have signed up coming from all over North America plus Australia and Scotland.

Sales were brisk at the tent and we soon had enough to cover the fees Fergus charges for our space.


During the opening ceremonies Gavin Gow showed up again and he along with Ed and I carried our banners onto the field.
